Khatamband is commonly used for false ceilings, panelling surfaces, as well as in the creation of table tops, doors, and various furniture items, showcasing its versatility and the rich heritage of Kashmiri craftsmanship.

Uniqueness

Khatamband is a unique art form from Kashmir, celebrated for its intricate woodwork and geometric patterns. This traditional craft involves the meticulous arrangement of thin wooden strips into elaborate designs, often featuring stars, hexagons, and other complex shapes. The use of local woods, such as walnut and deodar, adds both durability and beauty to the finished pieces.

This traditional wood craft uses wood that is carefully prepared, cut, intricately carved and then fitted together to form intricate geometrical designs with a definite mathematical foundation. The wood used is the locally available materials including pine, walnut and Himalayan Silver Fir. The basic technique consists of treating raw material, etching designs, cutting the wood into flat pieces and battens.
